The entire state remains clear of drought and dryness this week, although some areas in the northern Coastal Plain are seeing some signs of dryness creeping back.


This Week's Summary

Most of the rainfall last week was concentrated in the western half of the state, with little to no accumulations in the eastern Piedmont and Coastal Plain, even from the offshore Hurricane Erin. While the moisture from earlier this summer and the recent cooler temperatures have slowed the emergence of any dryness, some northeastern areas have been drier so far this month.

Next Week's Outlook

Fall-like weather with lower humidity and temperatures near 80°F will continue through Labor Day, along with mostly dry weather statewide over the next week.
